Community Spotlights: ExxonMobil Gives Back

ExxonMobil Pipeline Company supports local first responders, civic organizations and other non-profits through our Good Neighbor Grant program. This program provides funds to local tax-exempt organizations to support their community programs, educational initiatives and environmental projects.

Safety Highlight: First Responder Trainings

ExxonMobil Pipeline Company worked with the Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service (TEEX) to develop specialized firefighter training designed to teach them the techniques that help manage pipeline and terminal facility emergencies. The company also funds the tuition and expenses for firefighters who attend. To date, ExxonMobil has provided training to more than 250 firefighters.
